Activity Level 3

This activity rating uses the new scale of 1 to 4 introduced in November 2023.

High Activity: You are an active traveller who wants to explore wherever you go. You don't mind a mix of full days, early morning starts, and some late nights. This is a unique

tour with lots of activity and time outdoors while you experience many aspects of the Fraser River. The trip to the source of the Fraser requires getting in and out of a helicopter, and walking about ½ km in an alpine meadow at 2,000 metres altitude. On other days, you are boarding a large raft and two boats. Another walk occurs in Farwell Canyon. This tour has activity ranging from somewhat rigorous to sedentary. You can climb three flights of stairs easily and unassisted, and can handle your own luggage in an airport or at hotels where luggage handling is not available. This tour is not appropriate for people with canes, walkers, wheelchairs, or other mobility assistance devices. The tour director and driver have many responsibilities, so please do not expect them, or your fellow travellers, to provide ongoing assistance. If you are not capable of keeping up with the group or require frequent assistance, the tour director may stop you from participating in some activities or some days of the tour. In extreme situations, you may be required to leave the tour and travel home at your own expense; travel insurance will probably not cover you.

Please note: Prior to accepting your booking, you will be required to sign a declaration that you are capable of travelling on an Activity Level 3 tour.

Wednesday, September 4	Passengers from Vancouver Island and the Lower Mainland fly to Kelowna and overnight at the Hampton Inn YLW.		
	Accommodation: Hampton Inn & Suites YLW		
Thursday, September 5	We follow the Yellowhead Highway along the North Thompson River with a stop at 75-metre high Spahats Falls in Wells Gray Park . Our first two nights are in Valemount.		
	Meals included: ULunch, Dinner VOBreakfast, Lunch, Dinner Accommodation: Comfort Inn Valemount		
Friday, September 6	Our scenic helicopter flight takes us past the rugged Ramparts and the Bennington Glacier to the source of the Fraser River high on the Continental Divide. The helicopter lands on the alpine meadows and you have about 45 minutes to stroll the area. Fewer than 200 people, most of them travelling with Wells Gray Tours, have seen the remarkable phenomenon of a tiny dripping spring flowing into a pond from where the Fraser River, just 15 cm or six inches wide, starts its long journey to the ocean. Your tour director guides you to the spring and you can have your picture taken straddling the "mighty Fraser".		
	Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch Accommodation: Comfort Inn Valemount		
Saturday, September 7	We board large 12-passenger rafts and float gently down 8 km of the Fraser River for 1½ hours, watching for bears, moose, deer, bald eagles, beaver dams, and chinook salmon. Interpretive talks are provided by a guide on each raft. Dominating the view from the river is Mount Robson , highest in the Canadian Rockies at nearly 4,000 metres. There is no white water on this excursion. Back on our coach, a stop is made at Rearguard Falls, the upper limit of salmon migration on the Fraser. This afternoon, we drive west to Prince George, following the broad rift valley called the Rocky Mountain Trench and getting some views of the meandering Fraser. Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch Accommodation: Ramada Plaza Hotel		
Sunday, September 8	During a drive around Prince George , we enjoy the view from Connaught Hill and take a nature walk at Cottonwood Island. The Fraser River rounds its "Big Bend" near Prince George and turns south. At this point, it is only 12 km to the Arctic drainage and, starting in the mid-19th century, the Giscome Portage Trail served early travellers. Huble Homestead was built in 1912 at this strategic bend of the Fraser. A heritage tour is followed by lunch in the old barn. Then we drive the Cariboo Highway south through Quesnel and stay two nights in Williams Lake.		
	Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch Accommodation: Coast Fraser Inn		
Monday, September 9	The legendary Chilcotin Highway starts at Williams Lake and heads west to Bella Coola. We cross the Fraser River on a lofty bridge and drive across the vast ranchlands of the Chilcotin Plateau to Riske Creek. A highlight is the view of the glacial blue Chilcotin River as it races through Farwell Canyon . Lunch is included at historic Chilcotin Lodge . This afternoon, we visit the Cariboo Chilcotin Museum in Williams Lake.		
	Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch Accommodation: Coast Fraser Inn		

ITINERARY continued

Tuesday, September 10	Our first stop is at the colourful Painted Chasm, created by glacial meltwaters at the end of the last Ice Age. Next is Hat Creek Ranch , one of the last remaining roadhouses from the era of the Cariboo Wagon Road. We tour the buildings, ride the stagecoach, and listen to tales of the Gold Rush. We drive beneath the soaring white cliffs of Marble Canyon and along the terraces above Fountain Canyon and Moran Canyon where a gigantic dam was planned in the 1960s to harness the Fraser River. The Bridge of the 23 Camels crosses the Fraser into Lillooet and commemorates that oddity in B.C. history when camels were used as pack animals to the gold fields. We visit the Lillooet Museum, the 1880s Miyazaki House, and the Hanging Tree. Dinner is at Ashcroft Manor, another roadhouse which dates to 1862. Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner Accommodation: Sandman Inn Cache Creek
Wednesday, September 11	Today features sights through the famous Fraser Canyon . The clear Thompson River flows into the muddy Fraser at Lytton. We ride the Hell's Gate Airtram down to this awesome spectacle where the Fraser squeezes between sheer rock walls. We stop in Yale at St. John the Divine, B.C.'s oldest church which dates to 1863. At Hope, the Fraser emerges from its canyon into the fertile farmlands of the Fraser Valley and turns west for its final 160 km to the ocean. We stay at Harrison Hot Springs Resort in the east tower rooms, all with lake views. Relax in the soothing hot pools, then dine in elegance in the Copper Room with music and dancing by the Jones Boys. Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner Accommodation: Harrison Hot Springs Resort
Thursday, September 12	We take a scenic cruise on Harrison Lake while viewing bird and animal life with expert commentary. Next we visit Kilby Historic Site , a wonderful restoration of a century-old general store and farm. It was operated by the Kilby family from 1906 to 1977 and is now a provincial historic site. Included is an interior tour of the store, a walk around the farm, and the delightful show <i>Victorian Secrets</i> which incorporates humour, music, and many 'revealing' surprises. We stay two nights in New Westminster at the Inn at the Quay, built on a pier jutting into the Fraser River. Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch Accommodation: Inn at the Quay
Friday, September 13	We board the MV Gikumi for a four-hour excursion down the last 30 km of the Fraser River. At Steveston, the Fraser finally flows into the Strait of Georgia and we cruise offshore to see its brown fresh water mingling with the blue salt water. A Spanish captain, José María Narváez, is credited with being the first European to see the Fraser River in 1791 when he saw "a vast brown stain lying upon the sea." He called it Boca de Florida Blanca and noted that the water was "more sweet than salt". Don't miss your tour director's "Water Ceremony" where a bottle of water collected from the Fraser's source is poured into the ocean, completing our journey along the entire river. Back on shore, we tour the Gulf of Georgia Cannery National Historic Site, then return to New Westminster by coach. We visit the Fraser River Discovery Center and hear a guest speaker talk about the Fraser River, then enjoy a farewell dinner. Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner Accommodation: Inn at the Quay
Saturday, September 14	We journey home. Passengers travelling to the BC Interior will have a stop at Bridal Falls.

TOUR NOTES

THE MIGHTY FRASER "Our past, present and future are linked with the Fraser. The past saw fur-traders, the gold rush of 1858, and early settlers. The present sees waters teeming with migrating salmon and a highway and railways confined to the gorge carved by the river. The Fraser, beautiful, bountiful and powerful, must always flow in the pattern of our future."

So read one of British Columbia's stop-of-interest plaques, erected in the early 1960s by the Department of Recreation & Conservation to provide travellers with 50word snippets of roadside history. "The Mighty Fraser" plaque was located on the Trans-Canada Highway near Laidlaw and was relocated to the riverside park in Hope when the freeway was built in the 1980s.

The message is still true today, 60 years later, because the Fraser is truly British Columbia's great river. Flowing entirely within the province, it starts from a spring 50 km south of Yellowhead Pass and ends, 1390 km later, in the Strait of Georgia near Vancouver. Along the Fraser's tortuous route, it races past Mount Robson, highest in the Canadian Rockies; it tumbles over Rearguard Falls where salmon can swim no further; it meanders for 250 km through the broad Rocky Mountain Trench; it flows past old homesteads like the Huble Farm and under historic crossings such as the Lillooet and Alexandra Suspension Bridges; it passes industrial cities like Prince George and Quesnel; it plunges through the awesome Fraser Canyon and squeezes through Hell's Gate. At the end of its journey, the Fraser spreads out into multiple channels and carries its huge load of sediment quietly into the ocean at Steveston.

The Fraser River's intrigue is not only its geography, but the vital role it has played in British Columbia's history. First Nations tribes lived and worked on its banks long before Europeans arrived; fur traders such as Simon Fraser and Alexander Mackenzie travelled on its waters over 200 years ago; thousands of miners sought gold on its sandbars in the 1850s; a route for the Canadian Pacific Railway was blasted through its canyons in the 1880s; and Vancouver grew from hamlet to metropolis at its outlet. The source of the Fraser River was discovered by a Beautiful British Columbia Magazine team in the mid-1980s. The nearest road is 50 km away and there is no trail to the site, so the only access is by a helicopter. Fewer than 200 people, most of them travelling with Wells Gray Tours, have seen the remarkable phenomenon of a tiny dripping spring flowing into a pond from where the 15cm wide Fraser River starts its long journey to the ocean. This tour lets you experience the thrill of a helicopter ride, as well as planting your feet on each side of the not-somighty Fraser. You have bragging rights for a truly unique opportunity!

In the United States, there is lots of enthusiasm for its great river, the Mississippi. Coach tours follow it from source to mouth and sightseeing vessels ply its waters to the end of navigation. In 2000, Roland Neave, owner of Wells Gray Tours, reasoned that if Americans can celebrate the Mississippi, we should do the same with British Columbia's own great river, the Fraser, and so this tour was born in 2001. The tour has been offered every 3 to 4 years since and 2008 was a special year being the 200th Anniversary of Simon Fraser's journey down his namesake river in 1808. Come and join Wells Gray Tours' own celebration of Simon Fraser and the mighty Fraser as you follow it from source to mouth.

Accommodation: Some nights of this tour are "off the beaten track" so please do not expect luxury hotels in Valemount and Cache Creek. Although Lillooet would be a logical overnight stop, there are no accommodations that we consider suitable.

Helicopter: Most people have never flown in a helicopter and it is an exhilarating experience. We will not know the capacity of the helicopter until early September, probably 4-6 passengers. The flight to the Fraser River source is arranged with Yellowhead Helicopters, based in Valemount. Depending on numbers, flights may go from their base in Valemount or from near Yellowhead Pass. A safety briefing is provided.

TOUR POLICIES

Payments: A deposit of \$300 per person is requested at the time of booking and balance is due July 16, 2024. By paying the deposit, you agree to the Terms & Conditions, Activity Level and Cancellation Policy outlined. Payments can be made by online banking or cheque (1.5% discount on tour fare), or by Visa or Mastercard (\$5,000 limit per person on credit cards).

Early Booking Bonus: Early bookers receive \$240 discount on first 8 seats and \$120 on next 4 seats for booking early with deposit. The discount is not offered after July 16, 2024.

Cancellation Policy: Up to June 17, 2024, the cancellation charge is \$100 per person. From June 18 to July 16, the cancellation charge is \$200 per person. From July 17 to August 1, the cancellation charge is 50% of the tour fare. After August 1, there is no refund.

Itinerary and Fare Changes: Due to continuing after effects of the pandemic, sometimes we are notified about changes to the itinerary prior to departure and sometimes during the tour. We do our best to substitute a similar service if something cancels, but occasionally the only alternative is to provide a refund for the missed activity. Travel Insurance: A Comprehensive Insurance policy is available through Wells Gray Tours and coverage is provided by Travel Guard. Policies purchased at deposit include a waiver of the pre-existing condition clause for medical and cancellation claims, otherwise policies can be purchased no later than at final payment. Medical questionnaire is not needed. Please contact us for details.

Flight delays due to weather: In the event flights are delayed or cancelled by airlines due to weather, there may be additional costs to you. Wells Gray Tours Ltd. will not pay for hotel rooms and meals during the delay. Most travel insurance policies cover expenses incurred for weather delays.

PLEASE CAREFULLY READ THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION:

ACCOMMODATIONS: The hotels named in the tour descriptions are confirmed at the time the brochure is printed. It is very unusual for changes to occur, but clients will be notified whenever possible.

• Hotel Lists: Your ticket package contains a hotel list, which gives the hotel name, address, and phone number. You can leave this list with family/friends so you can be contacted while on your tour.

• **Special rooming requests:** If you wish to have a ground floor room where there is no elevator, a lower floor room in a high-rise hotel, or a room adjacent to another traveller, please make this request at the time you book your tour. DEPARTURE TIMES: We suggest that you arrive at your departure point no later than 15 minutes prior to the time shown on your ticket. The first day of a tour usually has many stops for client pick up. Please turn on your cell phone so the tour director can notify you if the coach is late.

TRAVEL INSURANCE: Insurance is **not included** in tour fares, but it is available for purchase. We strongly recommend purchasing insurance to protect the non-refundable portion of your fare and to provide coverage for unexpected events. Our policies are underwritten by AIG Insurance Company of Canada. Policy must be purchased no later than the time of final payment. Policies purchased at deposit include a waiver of the pre-existing condition clause as relates to cancellation, upgrade, or trip interruption. A detailed brochure is available. Premiums are always subject to change until paid as insurance companies can change premiums without notice.

GRATUITIES: Gratuities are at your discretion; however, they are a significant portion of income for these professionals. Please use local currency. The following are guidelines:

• **Tour director and coach driver:** \$7 CAD per person per day to the tour director and \$5 per person per day to the driver. Please do not start a group collection. The most discreet method is to place the tip in an envelope and on the final day either hand it to the tour director or driver or leave it on her/his seat.

• **Meals**: In Canada and the USA, 15-20% of the pre-tax bill; note: For included meals, gratuities have been included.

• Housekeeping staff: \$2 per person per night local currency.

• **Luggage handling**: \$2 per bag. Note: Tip for one piece of luggage at hotel is usually included.

• Transfer driver with luggage handling: \$2 per person. LOST ITEMS: Clients disembarking at the end of a tour are urged to check that they have all their personal belongings with them. Lost items are usually held in Kamloops or Victoria Wells Gray offices.

CURRENCY: Your credit card is a convenient way to pay for many meals and purchases. ATMs are easily accessible in Canada and the USA but may be difficult to find in other countries. You should also carry some cash with you in the currency of that country for gratuities and in case credit cards cannot be used.

LUGGAGE: The limit per person is one large suitcase, weighing no more than 50 lbs., and a small carry-on bag. A luggage tag is included in your ticket package. The Wells Gray tag is essential for the efficient handling of bags at hotels. Please attach the completed tag to your suitcase before arriving at your departure point. If you are on a cruise, please do not attach your cruise luggage tag until the morning of embarkation. Airlines charge a fee for checked luggage on Canada and USA flights. This is included in your tour fare if the airline allows Wells Gray to prepay this fee, but if payment is required at the airport, you must pay this directly to the airline at check-in.

COMMENT SHEETS: We always strive to improve, and comments from our customers are very important. Your tour director will hand out a comment sheet during the tour (with a confidential envelope if desired), so you can tell us what you think. To maintain a high standard of service, Wells Gray management reads every client's comments and discusses any problems and praises with the hotels, motorcoach company, other suppliers, and our staff.

TOUR PACKAGE: Your tour price includes all items listed in the "What's Included" section in the tour brochure. GST on applicable tours is extra.



PAYMENTS: A deposit is required within three days of booking and is outlined in each tour brochure. If a deposit or balance becomes overdue and we cannot contact you, your reservation will be cancelled. By placing a deposit, you agree to the Terms and Conditions. Payments can be made by online banking or cheque (1.5% discount on tour fare), or by Visa or Mastercard (\$5,000 limit per person on credit cards). If your cheque payment returns as 'non-sufficient funds', Wells Gray Tours Ltd. must charge you a \$25 NSF fee.

CANCELLATIONS: The cancellation policy for each tour is described in detail in the tour brochure. If you cancel after the final payment date, without paying in full, you forfeit the full deposit paid.

CONSUMER PROTECTION: In British Columbia, Consumer Protection BC requires that any business or organization that collects advance deposits from people for future travel must be registered with the government and must hold those deposits in trust. This protects consumer deposits in the unlikely event of bankruptcy. Wells Gray Tours Ltd. is also a member in good standing of the National Tour Association, which requires its members to carry at least \$1 million in professional liability, errors, and omission insurance.

BORDER CROSSING: For any travel outside of Canada, a valid passport is required. Passport numbers and expiry dates are required in advance for many tours, and this information will be collected before final payment. Clients are responsible for ensuring that they have valid documentation for all border crossings. Clients without valid documents may be detained by Customs Officers and therefore miss their tour. Wells Gray Tours Ltd. cannot assume responsibility for portions of a tour missed due to improper documentation.

ROOM PARTNERS: Wells Gray Tours Ltd. cannot assume responsibility for added costs due to disagreements encountered while travelling or for cancellations by one party of a double or twin accommodation room prior to departure.

LUGGAGE & LOST ITEMS: Luggage insurance is not included in your fare. Please note that neither Wells Gray Tours Ltd. nor the motorcoach company can assume responsibility for lost or damaged luggage or its contents.

ITINERARY: Expect the unexpected. If you are unable to participate in all aspects of the itinerary, Wells Gray Tours Ltd. will not issue a refund or provide a fare reduction for any missed or unused portions of the tour package. If any unforeseen delays, cancellations, changes, or add-ons happen that are beyond Wells Gray Tours control, (or by customer choice) there may be extra costs involved that may be passed onto you, the client, after the trip returns. There is no guarantee of refunds or reimbursements.

EXPERIENCE POINTS: Each time you travel with Wells Gray Tours, you earn Experience Points (e-points). The number of e-points you earn is written on the front page of each tour brochure. Your e-points will be awarded to you after your tour returns and can then be redeemed on future tours. E-Points must be earned before they can be redeemed. 1 e-point is equivalent to \$1.00.

PHOTOGRAPHY: Wells Gray Tours Ltd. and its designated tour director reserve the right to take photographs or videos during the operation of any tour or part thereof and to use the resulting photography or videos for promotion on Facebook, the Wells Gray Tours Ltd. website or for other commercial uses. By making a reservation with Wells Gray Tours Ltd., you agree to allow your likeness to be used by Wells Gray Tours Ltd. without compensation to you. If you prefer that your likeness not be used, please notify us in writing at final payment, or give a note to the tour director on the first day.

Terms & Conditions

CHANGES TO FARES: Due to the uncertainties of inflation, fuel surcharges, taxes and foreign exchange, Wells Gray Tours Ltd. reserves the right to modify tour fares in the event of cost changes. **COVID-19:** Some countries we are visiting may require all tour participants to be tested for Covid-19 prior to departure and/or be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 at least 14 days prior to departure. You are responsible for ensuring you meet the requirements for the countries they you are visiting. **Expect changes to the itinerary.** It may not be possible to communicate changes ahead of departure.

FACE MASK REQUIREMENTS: Although it is not mandatory, Wells Gray Tours strongly encourages everyone to wear a face mask at airports, in public places, and onboard motor coaches, ships and airplanes. If you unfortunately become ill with Covid-19, you can still ride on the coaches in the rear seat, but you must wear a KN-95 or N-95 mask.

TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS: Wells Gray Tours Ltd. has no special knowledge regarding the financial condition of any supplier or the existence of unsafe conditions, health hazards, weather hazards, political conditions, or climate extremes at locations to which you may travel.
