Parry Channel and Bellot Strait provide a passage to Queen Maud Gulf and onward along Victoria Island to our destination, Kugluktuk, the end of our epic journey.

Enjoy the upgraded comfort of the *Exploris One*, Adventure Canada's new ship in 2026. There are only 144 people on board.



**BC Interior:** We fly to Toronto on Monday, August 24. We fly home from Yellowknife on Saturday, September 12. Transportation to and from Kamloops, Kelowna, or Penticton Airport is not provided.



**Vancouver Island:** We fly from Victoria, Nanaimo, or Comox to Toronto on Monday, August 24. We fly home from Yellowknife on Saturday, September 12. While we always prioritize convenient connections for our clients, sometimes it is not possible given the airline schedule and availability. You will be contacted regarding your schedule after final payment.

**Departure from Victoria:** Transportation to and from Victoria Airport is not provided.

**Departure from Up-island:** Transportation to and from Nanaimo or Comox Airport is not provided. Please request departure from Nanaimo or Comox Airport at the time of booking.



**Lower Mainland:** We fly from Vancouver or Abbotsford to Toronto on Monday, August 24. We fly home from Yellowknife on Saturday, September 12. Home pickup for clients in the Greater Vancouver Area may be arranged at the time of booking.

## **Activity Level 2**

**Moderate Activity:** As a traveller you like a variety of activities and walking up to 2 km with breaks such as a guided walking tour is very doable for you without assistance. You

can stand for prolonged periods, negotiate a variety of terrain such as beaches and moderate hills comfortably, and can climb two flights of stairs without assistance. On the ship, there are stairs to board the Zodiacs. Expeditions away from the ship are on Zodiacs and you could be sitting on those for up to 2 hours. You must handle your own luggage and walk longer distances in airports. You may need to handle your own luggage at the hotels if luggage service is not available.

Walking poles are recommended. This tour is not appropriate for people with canes, walkers, wheelchairs, or other mobility assistance devices. The coaches or ship cannot carry a scooter or motorized wheelchair. The tour director (first 3 days), drivers, Zodiac pilots, and expedition leaders have many responsibilities, so please do not expect them, or your fellow travellers, to provide ongoing assistance. If you are not capable of keeping up with the group or require frequent assistance, the ship's staff may stop you from participating in some activities or some days of the cruise. In extreme situations, you may be required to leave the tour and travel home at your own expense; travel insurance will probably not cover you.



#### **Tour Size 15**

The current maximum group size is 15 based on the staterooms we have on hold with Adventure Canada. We may exceed this number if there is enough interest and staterooms are still available.



### Monday, August 24

Flights are arranged to Toronto. We stay two nights at the Sheraton Gateway Hotel, conveniently located above Terminal 3 in Pearson Airport.

### Tuesday, August 25

This morning, we ride up the **CN Tower**, one of the tallest buildings in the world at 550 metres, and enjoy a panoramic view of Toronto. Are you brave enough to stand on the glass floor? Later we visit **Casa Loma**, Toronto's fabulous castle built by Sir Henry Pellatt between 1911 and 1914, and today used in many movie productions. It has 98 rooms, secret passages, and two towers, and cost \$3½ million to build. A gathering of all passengers on the ship is planned in late afternoon, and a briefing prepares you for the Arctic adventure ahead. A get-acquainted dinner follows for Wells Gray travellers only.

### Wednesday, August 26

We take a charter flight for about 4½ hours from Toronto to Nuuk on the west coast of **Greenland**. This is one of the world's northernmost capital cities, located just south of the Arctic Circle. **Nuuk** means 'the headland' and is situated at the mouth of a gigantic fjord system. Established in 1728, Nuuk is Greenland's cultural and economic hub, and blends modern life with rich history and stunning natural beauty. The town is home to the University of Greenland, a cathedral dating back to 1849, and Greenland's National Museum. With a population of under 20,000 people, it's one of the smallest capital cities in the world, offering a unique mix of contemporary architecture and traditional Inuit culture. This afternoon, we board the *Exploris One* and settle into our staterooms.

# Thursday, August 27 Friday, August 28

The West Greenland coastline is a mixture of charming fishing communities, rocky islands and complex coastal waterways. Depending on timing and sea conditions, we will call in at a community such as **Qeqqata Kommunia** to experience small town Greenlandic life, or we may navigate into the incredible fjords that line the coast. These two days are the true spirit of expedition travel and we will avail ourselves of any opportunities.

### Saturday, August 29

Venturing 250 km north of the Arctic Circle, we find the stunning coastal community of **Ilulissat**. The name translates literally into "iceberg" and this couldn't be more fitting. Our visit includes time in the colourful town and a short hike on

a boardwalk to a panoramic view of the vast **Ilulissat Icefield** which is 50 km long and 6 km across. It produces most of the icebergs seen in the North Atlantic and off Newfoundland. We board zodiacs to explore close to the awesome face of the glacier where it reaches the ocean. It is one of the most active and fastest moving in the world at 19 metres per day and calves more than 35 square km of ice annually. The glacier has been studied for 250 years and has significantly added to the understanding of ice-cap glaciology.

### Sunday, August 30

**Uummannaq Fjord** in northwest Greenland is the country's second-largest system of fjords. It is considered to be the sunniest spot in Greenland and favourable weather, coupled with proximity to coastal travel routes, has made the fjord system a popular destination for the Inuit. It has been settled continually for the last 4,500 years. Our time in Uummannaq is spent cruising and exploring; staff experts are on deck to help spot wildlife and explain the dramatic scenery surrounding the ship. Take a moment to savour the tranquility and absorb the knowledge and stories shared by Inuit cultural educators which deepen your connection to this breathtaking landscape. This evening, the ship turns west and starts the crossing of **Baffin Bay** between Greenland and Baffin Island.

**Accommodation:** Exploris One

### Monday, August 31

As we sail toward Nunavut, the ship's expedition team present programs that enhance your understanding of the Arctic. This is an excellent time to enjoy workshops, watch a documentary, or get out on deck. Keep your binoculars ready for minke and humpback whales, as well as the seabirds that are sure to mark our passage. Take the unique opportunity to learn from the Inuit in their homeland through cultural performances, participating in Inuit games, or sampling their cuisine.

**Accommodation:** Exploris One

### Tuesday, September 1

The ship stops at a Nunavut village, but weather and tides determine which one. A possibility is **Qikiqtarjuaq** (called "Qik" for short), a community on Broughton Island known as the iceberg capital of Nunavut. Enjoy the warmth of an Inuit welcome as drum dancers, throat singers, and cultural ambassadors share their stories, songs, and connections to the land. Explore the beautiful surroundings of an Arctic hamlet, get to know local residents, learn about their ways of life, and purchase their handicrafts.

### Wednesday, September 2

We spend ample time exploring **Tallurutiup Imanga** (Lancaster Sound), one of the newest National Marine Conservation Areas in Nunavut. Narwhal, beluga, and bowhead whales transit and feed in this area. We cruise by ship and Zodiac in search of wildlife with expert biologists and ecologists. Learn about the crucial role Inuit play in conserving the vibrant biodiversity of these waterways.

### **Thursday, September 3**

Tallurutiup Imanga is bounded on the north by **Devon Island**, the largest uninhabited island in the world at over 50,000 square kilometres. Flat-topped mountains, glacial valleys, and a substantial ice cap give Devon Island its unique character. We hike the tundra, cruise by Zodiac along the stunning face of **Croker**

**Glacier**, and watch for wildlife including 26 species of seabirds and 11 species of marine mammals. We visit archaeological sites and the remains of an RCMP and Hudson's Bay Company site at Dundas Harbour.

**Accommodation:** Exploris One

### Friday, September 4

Exploris One anchors in the sheltered bay at **Beechey Island** which has seen so many Arctic sagas unfold. In 1845, Sir John Franklin set out from England with *HMS Erebus* and *Terror*, attempting to sail through the Northwest Passage. Franklin's party wintered at Beechey Island where three of his men died. Numerous search parties later used Beechey as a depot and rendezvous. Amundsen, Bernier, and Larsen visited Beechey. Thomas Morgan of the *HMS Investigator* was buried there in 1854 alongside Franklin's men. The graves and the ruins of Northumberland House are a haunting memorial to that tragic expedition. Take an optional rigorous hike to the top of Beechey Island and see the monument built by Franklin at the icy crossroads of the Arctic.

### Saturday, September 5

The 'obvious' route of the Northwest Passage, Parry Channel, seldom provides a full transit because of ice. It is named after Arctic explorer William Parry who got as far as Melville Island in 1819 before being blocked by ice. Peel Sound was Franklin's route south. It presents numerous wildlife and exploratory opportunities. As we sail through this region, we enter prime polar bear territory and watch for good spotting opportunities. The area is also home to muskoxen, belugas, and other wildlife, making every moment a potential discovery. Depending on ice conditions, we may make expedition stops among these spectacular landscapes, a perfect setting for hiking and exploring the geological diversity of the area.



### Sunday, September 6

We traverse the famed **Ikirahaq** (**Bellot Strait**), a narrow passage separating Somerset Island from the Boothia Peninsula. As we sail through this canal-like waterway for 25 km, the northernmost point of mainland North America is on the ship's port side. One of the on-board talks is about Joseph René Bellot who gave his name to the strait. He was a French naval officer and Arctic explorer who joined an 1850s expedition in search of Franklin.

We cruise through many channels comprising the Northwest Passage and the route may vary depending on ice conditions, even in early September. Known as the Kitikmeot Region, it consists of parts of Victoria Island, the adjacent part of the mainland as far as the Boothia Peninsula, King William Island, and southern Prince of Wales Island. Two communities are **Usqsuqtuuq (Gjoa Haven) and Cambridge Bay**. These waters have been in the news since Franklin's lost ships, **Erebus and Terror**, were found in 2014 and 2016; Parks Canada has organized diving expeditions each summer to survey the wrecks and retrieve fascinating artifacts. We navigate the ice-strewn waters of this fabled waterway for four days searching for wildlife, visiting a community where Inuit hosts share the culture of this region, and learning about the triumphs of explorers like Roald Amundsen and the vital role that Inuit knowledge played in successful crossings.

### Friday, September 11

On our last morning, we cruise through Coronation Gulf to reach the end of our epic expedition at **Kugluktuk**. It has been an incredible journey through the Northwest Passage, an achievement few can claim. Arriving in Kugluktuk, take pride in having traversed one of the world's most historic and storied waterways, following in the wake of legendary explorers while forging your own unforgettable path through the Arctic. Located at the mouth of the Coppermine River, Kugluktuk is the westernmost community in Nunavut. Known for many years as Coppermine, the community reverted to its original Inuinnaqtun name meaning "place of moving waters" in 1996. We disembark the *Exploris One* and board a charter flight to **Yellowknife**.

# THE LEGENDARY NORTHWEST PASSAGE

Since the 17<sup>th</sup> century, world explorers have dreamed of a ship route through North America to the fabled riches of Asia. Dozens of expeditions have set out to find it. Some returned safely with extraordinary tales of the Arctic, but many others were never seen again. The famous Franklin Expedition of 1845 was one that simply disappeared, spawning numerous searches, and the mystery of the final resting places of *HMS Erebus* and *HMS Terror* was not solved until 2014 and 2016.

The Northwest Passage represents the pinnacle of Arctic exploration. On this trip, like the adventurers before us, we will experience the quaint villages, dramatic fjords, and calving glaciers of Greenland. After crossing Baffin Bay, we plan to visit Qikiqtarjuaq, the iceberg capital of Nunavut, and pay respects at the Franklin Expedition graves at Beechey Island. Somerset and Devon Islands

offer opportunities to spot caribou, polar bear, walrus, and muskox, and for visits to long-abandoned RCMP and Hudson's Bay posts. Parry Channel and Peel Sound afford a passage to Queen Maud Gulf and onward along Victoria Island to our destination, Kugluktuk, the end of our epic journey above the Arctic Circle.

To sail the Northwest Passage is to sail living history. Meet the Inuit who have called this remarkable place home for generations. Attend daily presentations on the ship and listen to experts in many fields related to the Northwest Passage and the Arctic. Explore secluded bays and channels using the ship's fleet of zodiacs, and get very close to stunning glaciers and icebergs. Join the ranks of the adventurers who have been lured by the legends of the Northwest Passage.



In 2026, Adventure Canada will acquire a new vessel, Exploris One. It was built in Finland in 1989 and received major refurbishments in 2019 and 2023. The ship is 108 metres long and has 5 public decks. The ship carries only 144 passengers. Outside staterooms in categories 2, 3 and 4 have picture windows, sitting area, and marble bathroom with a typical size of 182 to 190 square feet. Category 5 also has a private balcony and is a little larger at 215 square feet. There are no inside staterooms. All decks can be reached by elevators. There are 2 restaurants, the main dining room on Deck 4 and the outside grill on Deck 6. Most talks by the onboard experts are held in the Learning Lounge, but other gathering places are the Main Lounge and Observation Lounge. Other facilities are a library, fitness centre, sauna, spa with massage treatments, 2 outdoor jacuzzis, a gift shop, self-serve laundry, and medical centre.

Adventure Canada's expedition staff are experts on the Arctic including geology, glaciation, history, Inuit culture, marine life, birds, and plants. There are frequent lectures, educational presentations, and interactive workshops. Evening entertainment is offered. There is a fully stocked library for additional reading about the cruise destinations. During many days, there are expeditions ashore or to nearby attractions using the ship's Zodiacs.

All meals are included in the restaurants and there are also on-deck barbeques and afternoon tea. Coffee, tea, and snacks are available 24 hours a day. Hors d'oeuvres and snacks are served during evening programs. Alcoholic beverages are complimentary throughout the voyage.

If you have travelled previously on Adventure Canada's ship *Ocean Endeavour*, the *Exploris One* is a significant upgrade with nicely appointed staterooms and public rooms.

# **TOUR & CRUISE NOTES**

Documentation: A passport is required and must be valid for 3 months after you leave Greenland. A Visa is not required for Canadians.

Please book early! Due to extremely high demand for Northwest Passage voyages, the Exploris One may be full for this cruise a year in advance. Wells Gray Tours has 7 staterooms held in categories 2, 3, 4, and 5. Unsold staterooms can be taken away from us at any time if the ship or even a category fills. Therefore, please don't delay booking this tour.

Early booking bonus: Fares quoted are based on Adventure Canada's early booking discount which ends June 16, 2025. Fares will increase significantly on June 16, 2025. It's possible that this deadline will be extended.

A loyalty discount is offered by Adventure Canada if you have travelled with them previously.

Cancellation penalties are higher than normal for a Wells Gray tour and effective dates are further out. These penalties are applied by the cruise line and cannot be altered, even for name changes.

Insurance: All passengers on Adventure Canada expeditions must have emergency medical and emergency medical evacuation insurance with a minimum of US\$500,000 coverage per person. Please note that this is a suggested minimum and that actual medical and evacuation costs could exceed this amount. It is your responsibility to review your policy details and ensure that coverage meets Adventure Canada's requirements. If you do not buy insurance through Wells Gray Tours, it is essential that you check your policy carefully. Insurance with your credit card or employee benefits is unlikely to cover what you need.

A Wells Gray tour director is not with you during the cruise, but one of our staff will be in Toronto on August 24-26. During the charter flights and on the ship, up to 20 Adventure Canada staff are available for assistance.

Deck Plans: We urge you to visit our office and look at the ship's deck plans to better choose your stateroom category. Deck plans are also available on the **Adventure** Canada website.

Flight seating: We are unable to take requests for window or aisle seating on the planes to Toronto and return from Yellowknife. The airline will not accept them, as group seating is assigned as a block. If this is important to you, we suggest you take the "No Flight" option with a fare reduction (amount available in September 2025) and book your own flight which allows seat selection.

Flight upgrades: Please enquire about current prices for upgrades on the flights to Toronto and return from Yellowknife. Premium economy and business class may be available. There are no upgrades available on the charter flights to Nuuk and return from Kugluktuk.

Flight delays or cancellations: Flights to Toronto and return from Yellowknife can be delayed or cancelled at the last minute, sometimes causing a missed connection. Wells Gray staff will try to assist with rebooking, but the airline usually wants to talk with the individual passenger. There may be an extra payment required if the issue is weather. Wells Gray Tours is not allowed to interfere with this process. Check that your travel insurance policy has a flight delay benefit because that is usually your best recourse for recouping additional flight costs.

Food Allergies: You must notify us no later than at final payment if you have a food allergy. The ship may not be able to satisfy all food allergies. An allergy causes medical distress, a preference does not. For some allergies, please consider bringing your own snacks or food items so you are not dependent on what the ship and other restaurants are able to serve. Most meals on the ship are served as a buffet and some allergies are noted with signs.

**Single travellers:** Only 7 single seats are available. Please book early if you prefer to travel single.



# **TOUR POLICIES**

**Payments:** A deposit of \$4,000 per person is requested at the time of booking and balance is due April 21, 2026. By paying the deposit, you agree to the **Terms & Conditions**, Activity Level and Cancellation Policy outlined. Payments can be made by online banking or cheque (3% discount on tour fare), or by Visa or Mastercard.

**Cancellation Policy:** Up to April 21, 2026, the cancellation charge is \$4,000 per person (your deposit). From April 22 to May 21, the cancellation charge is 65% of the tour fare. After May 21, there is no refund. Please be sure that your travel insurance policy covers these penalties.

Itinerary and Fare Changes: This Northwest Passage itinerary is subject to change due to weather, ice conditions, and tides. Safety is a primary concern in these remote places. The captain may change the route with little notice. A trip ashore in the Zodiacs may be cancelled if a polar bear is spotted within a few kilometres of the landing site. In short, expect changes to happen! Please note that if Adventure Canada announces an itinerary change anytime before departure, the current penalties still apply if you choose to cancel the entire tour. Fuel surcharges and changes to currency exchange, taxes or other tour costs can occur at any time, therefore Wells Gray Tours reserves the right to increase fares due to such changes up to departure.

**Travel Insurance:** A Comprehensive Insurance policy is available through Wells Gray Tours and coverage is provided by Travel Guard. Policies purchased at deposit include a waiver of the pre-existing condition clause, otherwise policies can be purchased no later than at final payment. The mandatory US\$500,000 evacuation coverage is included. Please contact us for details. If you choose to buy your own insurance, please refer to the note on page 6 about minimum travel insurance requirements.
