# DEPARTURE INFORMATION

Your departure point will be discussed at the time of booking.

**I BC Interior:** We depart on Wednesday, May 19 and drive to New Westminster for an overnight stay. We fly to Iceland the following day. We return to New Westminster for an overnight stay on Friday, June 4 after flying from Iceland to Vancouver. We travel home on Saturday, June 5. Transportation is provided from your pickup point on the day of departure, and back again when we return.

**V Vancouver Island:** We depart on Wednesday, May 19 and travel to New Westminster for an overnight stay. We fly to Iceland the following day. We return to New Westminster for an overnight stay on Friday, June 4 after flying from Iceland to Vancouver. We travel home on Saturday, June 5.

**Departure from Victoria:** For passengers in the Greater Victoria Area, transportation is provided from your pickup point on the day of departure and back when we return. Home pickup may be offered in the Greater Victoria Area depending on the number of people booked and coach size. The decision is made about 2 weeks before departure and you will be contacted about your pickup point and time.

**Departure from Up-Island:** There is an additional cost for passengers who wish to fly from/to Nanaimo or Comox Airport on this tour. Transportation to/from Nanaimo or Comox Airport is not provided. While we always prioritize convenient connections for our clients, sometimes it is not possible given the airline schedule and availability. You will be contacted regarding your schedule after final payment. Please request departure from Nanaimo or Comox at the time of booking.

**L Lower Mainland:** We fly from Vancouver to Iceland on Thursday, May 20. We fly from Iceland to Vancouver on Friday, June 4.

**Departure from Vancouver:** Home pickup for passengers in the Greater Vancouver Area may be arranged at the time of booking.

**Departure from Langley, Abbotsford, or Chilliwack:** Pickup and drop off will be by the BC Interior coach including the overnight stays on May 19 and June 4. Please refer to the BC Interior dates and pricing.

# ITINERARY

## Wednesday, May 19

Passengers from the BC Interior and Vancouver Island travel to New Westminster. We stay overnight at the Inn at the Quay, built on a pier jutting into the Fraser River. Every room has a view of the river and you can watch all the shipping traffic going by. Meet your fellow travellers during a get-acquainted dinner.

**Note:** While it may seem unnecessary to travel to the Lower Mainland the day before your flight, the Coquihalla and ferries can have long closures or flights can be cancelled by weather which would cause a missed international flight.

**Meals included:** Lunch (BC Interior), Dinner (BC Interior & Vancouver Island)

**Accommodation:** Inn at the Quay (BC Interior & Vancouver Island)

## Thursday, May 20

The morning is leisure time and you may want to take a stroll along Westminster Quay. Passengers from Vancouver meet us at the airport. Our flight on **Icelandair** leaves mid-afternoon and takes 6½ hours to Keflavik Airport, located 50 km west of Reykjavik.

## Friday, May 21

**Welcome to Iceland!** The time change is 7 hours ahead of Pacific Time. After arrival at Keflavik, our Icelandic guide and driver are waiting to greet us and we drive to Viking World for breakfast under the restored Viking ship *Íslendingur*. Afterwards, enjoy a soothing swim in the **Blue Lagoon**, a natural geothermal pool in the middle of a dramatic lava field. The 40-degree Celsius mineral-rich water and white sediment is known for its healing properties. We have arranged the "Premium" package with three mud masks, towel, robe, and two beverages. Then we drive into **Reykjavik**, the northernmost capital of Europe. The name translates as "Smokey Bay" because the first settlers of Iceland saw steam rising from a cave in a geothermal area. We stay two nights in downtown Reykjavik.

## Saturday, May 22

During the morning, there is a sightseeing tour of Reykjavik. Weaving through narrow alleys framed with old timber houses, we learn about the life of the city from its beginning to the present. We visit the landmark **Hallgrímskirkja Church**, the harbour, the University, and drive by **Höfði House** where the Reagan-Gorbachev summit took place in 1986. We also enjoy the panorama of Reykjavik from the Perlan viewing deck and the Wonders of Iceland Museum. The afternoon is leisure time to enjoy the multitude of shops along Laugavegur near our hotel.

## Sunday, May 23

We drive through an agricultural area with a mixture of farms and summer cottages.

**Hveragerði** has many greenhouses that grow vegetables and flowers, and are heated with natural warm water. Next is the Geysir area where we walk around boiling hot springs and hissing fumaroles, and admire **Strokkur Geysir** which erupts every 5-10 minutes. Nearby is one of Iceland's favourite waterfalls, **Gullfoss**, which plunges 30 metres into Hvítá Canyon. Later, we admire two more waterfalls, Barnafossar which tumbles under a natural bridge, and Hraunfossar which pours from under a lava flow. Nearby **Deildartunguhver** is one of the world's most powerful hot springs producing 198 litres per second of boiling water that is piped to coastal towns for heating. Next is Snorrastofa Museum, named after Snorri Sturluson, a poet, historian, and 13<sup>th</sup> century Icelandic character.

## Monday, May 24

It is a short drive to **Stykkisholmur** where we take a boat excursion around the rocky islands of **Breiðarfjörður**, viewing many nesting birds including puffins, kittiwakes, cormorants, fulmars, and possibly the king of Icelandic birds, the white-tailed eagle. We also visit the **Bjarnarhöfn**

**Shark Museum** which produces hákarl (fermented shark meat), a traditional Icelandic dish. There are exhibits about this culinary curiosity, the family's fishing boats, and their tools. You can also taste a sample of shark meat.

**Accommodation:** Fosshotel Stykkishólmur

## Tuesday, May 25

Today is spent on **Peninsula Snæfellsnes** with views of Snæfellsjökull where, according to Jules Verne, the entrance to the centre of the earth is found. Along the south coast, we see a rare light-coloured beach at Búðir and walk the clifftop at Arnarstapi past two natural bridges and lots of birdlife. The tip of Snæfellsnes and its north coast feature magnificent seascapes with dramatic cliffs, black sand beaches, and pounding surf.

**Accommodation:** Fosshotel Stykkishólmur

## Wednesday, May 26

We head east through green valleys, across ancient lava, and past nicely sculpted fjords such as Skagafjörður. At **Glaumbaer Folk Museum**, several turf buildings of the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries have been preserved. We also visit the turf church of Víðimýri which was built in 1834 under the guidance of Jón Samsonarson. Our destination is **Akureyri**, capital of the north and a big city on the Icelandic scale with 18,000 people. We stay two nights in the shopping district. Get your picture taken with the troll statues nearby!

**Meals included:** Breakfast, Dinner

**Accommodation:** Hotel Kea

## Thursday, May 27

We take the short ferry ride to **Hrísey**, Iceland's second largest island. The bird life is fantastic with lots of plovers, arctic terns, and ptarmigans. The island is also unique because cars are rare and most people get around on bicycles. We visit the House of Shark-Jörundur, a museum dedicated to the island's shark fishing heritage. Lunch is at a **microbrewery** with a tour and tastings. Back in Akureyri, a special treat is the relaxing 37-degree waters of the **Forest Lagoon**, one of Iceland's newest hot

springs facilities, offering two infinity pools and a sauna with water sourced directly from Vaðlaheiði Mountain.

**Meals included:** Breakfast, Lunch

**Accommodation:** Hotel Kea

## Friday, May 28

Our first stop is at **Goðafoss** ("Waterfall of the Gods") where, in the year 1000, a chieftain threw his pagan statues to prove his loyalty to the new Christian God. During the drive all around shallow **Lake Mývatn**, we explore natural wonders such as the moon-like crater Skútustadir, the bunkhouse for trolls, and the colourful boiling mud pots at Námaskarð.

**Accommodation:** Fosshotel Húsavík

## Saturday, May 29

The city of **Húsavík** is on the north coast and best known for an abundance of whales. The Húsavík Whale Museum has impressive exhibits about the habitat and ecology of whales, including several gigantic skeletons.

**Option:** Enjoy a whale-watching excursion from Húsavík, most likely seeing the minke. Cost is \$143 per person. Please request no later than final payment.

**Meals included:** Breakfast, Dinner

**Accommodation:** Fosshotel Húsavík

## Sunday, May 30

Our morning drive follows the rugged coastline of the **Tjörnes Peninsula** and the island of Grímsey is often visible – the only place in Iceland located above the Arctic Circle. In **Jökulsárgljúfur National Park**, we take walks into Asbyrgi Gorge and to awesome **Dettifoss**, Europe's largest waterfall. We follow the long valley of Jökuldalur to the farming region of Fljótsdalshérað and stay two nights in Egilsstaðir.

**Meals included:** Breakfast, Dinner

**Accommodation:** Berjaya Hotel Hérað

## Monday, May 31

Lake Lagarfljot is said to be home to a legendary giant lake-worm. We take an interesting walk through a rare Icelandic forest at **Hallormsstaður Arboretum**. Next is an exciting drive over a rugged pass to the fishing village of

**Borgarfjörður-Eystri** on the east coast. It is noted for a church altar painted by Jóhannes Kjarval, an art gallery with local stones, and a puffin colony.

**Meals included:** Breakfast, Dinner

**Accommodation:** Berjaya Hotel Hérað

## Tuesday, June 1

Today's drive goes through Fáskrúðsfjarðargöng, a 6-km long road tunnel between two fjords, Reydarfjörður and Fáskrúðsfjörður. We admire Petra Sveinsdóttir's vast local stone collection, then drive through green valleys and along the wild coastline to reach **Berufjörður**. The town was a busy place in the 16<sup>th</sup> century with Danish traders and offshore is the Island of Papey where Irish monks lived a thousand years ago. An awesome sight awaits – **Vatnajökull**, the largest glacier in Europe at 8,300 square km, covering about 8% of Iceland. Numerous tongues descend from its main ice cap which is an amazing contrast to the farmlands along the coast. We stay at the Fosshotel Jökulsárlón, one of the newest hotels in the southeast region.

**Meals included:** Breakfast, Dinner

**Accommodation:** Fosshotel Jökulsárlón

## Wednesday, June 2

At the **Jökulsárlón Glacial Lagoon**, we board an amphibious boat and sail among huge floating icebergs. This is certainly one of the highlights of our journey around Iceland. Further along the south coast, there are more views of Vatnajökull and Iceland's highest peak, **Hvannadalshnjúkur**, rising to 2,110 metres. The Skaftafell region of Vatnajökull National Park offers fascinating landscapes contrasted with glaciers, moors, mountains, braided rivers, and sandy plains. We take a walk to the snout of the Skaftafell Glacier. The road crosses **Skeiðarársandur**, a vast expanse of glacial outwash with a kilometre-long bridge.

**Meals included:** Breakfast, Dinner

**Accommodation:** Hotel Kea Katla

## Thursday, June 3

We stroll the beach at Vík, walk to the base of 60-metre tall Skógafoss, and venture behind the Seljalandsfoss waterfall. The **Lava Centre** is an interactive, high-tech exhibition depicting volcanic activity, earthquakes, and the creation of Iceland over millions of years. At the **Fridheimar Farm horse show**, we learn all about the small Icelandic horse. Next is **Þingvellir National Park**, site of the National Assembly which was founded here in 930 AD to rule the country, and we take a walk through the old parliament site. Þingvellir is not only important for Icelandic history, but also for geology because the meeting of two drifting continental plates can be seen here. This afternoon, we are back in **Reykjavik**, completing our grand circle drive around Iceland.

## Friday, June 4

The morning is leisure time, then we head to the Keflavik airport. It has lots of shops and restaurants, and you may want to claim a VAT refund on major purchases. In late afternoon, we fly on Icelandair to Vancouver. Passengers from Vancouver travel home, while passengers from the BC Interior and Vancouver Island overnight in New Westminster.

## ICELAND — A BUCKET LIST COUNTRY

Iceland is a remote island of nearly 104,000 square kilometres in the North Atlantic. Its highest peak, Hvannadalshnjúkur, rises to 2,110 metres and over 11 per cent of the country is covered by glaciers, including Vatnajökull, the largest in Europe. Situated on the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, Iceland is a hot spot of volcanic and geothermal activity: 30 volcanoes have erupted in the past two centuries and the 2010 eruption of Eyjafjallajökull caused havoc with the ash fallout in Europe. Natural hot water supplies much of the population with cheap, pollution-free heating. Many rivers have been harnessed for inexpensive hydro-electric power. The coastline is pierced by more than 100 fjords with green fertile valleys extending inland. Iceland also has countless waterfalls and numerous hot springs.

Out of a population numbering more than 300,000, half live in the capital of Reykjavik and its neighbouring towns in the southwest. The highland interior is uninhabited and most communities are situated on the coast. Iceland was settled by Nordic people in the 9<sup>th</sup> century. Tradition says that the first permanent settler was Ingólfur Arnarson, a Norwegian Viking who made his home where Reykjavik now stands. The early settlers founded one of the world's first republican governments which lasted until 1262 when Iceland lost its independence. The present republic was founded in 1944. The country is governed by the Althing (parliament) whose 63 members are elected every four years.

The chilliest thing about Iceland is its name! In January, the average temperature in Reykjavik is a little cooler than Vancouver. July is the warmest month with an average daytime temperature of about 14 degrees Celsius in Reykjavik and even warmer further north in Akureyri. These mild temperatures are thanks to the Gulf Current which sweeps around Iceland. May and June are the driest and sunniest months. The midnight sun can be experienced during this tour because the sun rises at 2 am and sets at midnight in Reykjavik, and never sets further north. Late May is also a wonderful time to visit Iceland because the weather is generally good, the summer crowds do not arrive until later in June, and the birdwatching opportunities are thrilling.

Iceland's economy was robust with income per capita among the highest in the world until 2008 when its three privatized banks collapsed due to unwise foreign investments. In the following years, the kronur currency lost 60% of its value. Previously Iceland had a reputation as a very expensive place to vacation and Wells Gray customers experienced this on our first tour in 2007, but a second tour in 2009 found amazing bargains by comparison. In the 16 years since, the economy has steadily improved and so has the kronur, bringing higher prices each year. Inflation since Covid has unfortunately been severe, with prices up 30% from 2023 to 2026. There are not enough hotel rooms from May to August for the huge demand (Wells Gray books rooms 2½ years in advance), and rooms are typically over \$300 a night. These factors make this tour expensive, but Iceland should be on everybody's bucket list, so we urge you to join us in 2027.

# ACTIVITY LEVEL 3



**High Activity:** You are an active traveller who wants to explore wherever you go.

You don't mind a mix of full days, early morning starts, and some late nights. You can walk longer distances, up to 4 km without difficulty which may be over uneven ground, beaches or boardwalks; climb in and out of small boats without

any assistance; walk on docks which may have steep ramps at low tide; and stand for prolonged periods. There are short walks at Gullfoss, Barnafossar, Arnarstapi, Lake Mývatn, Námaskarð, Dettifoss, Asbyrgi, and Þingvellir. You can climb three flights of stairs easily and unassisted, and can handle your own luggage in airports and at Iceland hotels where luggage handling is not available.

This tour is not appropriate for people with canes, walkers, wheelchairs, or other mobility assistance devices. Additionally, this tour is not appropriate for those who have cognitive impairments such as memory loss or confusion, difficulty expressing thoughts, repeating questions, or getting lost. Walking poles are recommended. The tour director and Iceland guide and driver have many responsibilities, so please do not expect them, or your fellow travellers, to provide ongoing assistance. If you are not capable of keeping up with the group or require frequent assistance, the tour director may stop you from participating in some activities or some days of the tour. In extreme situations, you may be required to leave the tour and travel home at your own expense; travel insurance will probably not cover you.

**Please note:** Prior to accepting your booking, you will be required to [sign a declaration](#) that you are capable of travelling on an Activity Level 3 tour.



## Tour size 25

This is a Tour 25 departure, meaning capacity of the tour is limited to 25 participants, a more intimate travel experience.

## TOUR NOTES

**Documentation:** A valid passport with sufficient blank pages is required and must not expire until 3 months after return date. A visa is not required.

**Currency and Expenses:** The exchange rate for the Icelandic Kronur (ISK) is subject to fluctuations; in April 2026, a Canadian dollar was worth 90 ISK. Flights cannot be confirmed until late July 2026. Air fares, taxes, and fuel surcharges are estimates only and are based on published rates for 2026.

**Please Book Early:** There is huge demand for Iceland and this tour is expected to sell out early as it has in past years. This tour was last offered in 2025.

**Accommodation** in Iceland is generally at the 3-star level, therefore expect basic, comfortable lodging. The only luxury hotels in Reykjavik are not downtown, so we have chosen a 3-star hotel that is close to shopping and restaurants. Elsewhere, many communities only have one hotel. The Fosshotel Jökulsárlón is rated as 4-stars.

**Meals:** Only a few lunches in Iceland are included because lunch in a sit-down restaurant can cost over \$40. It is much cheaper to stop at grocery stores and gas stations where there is a deli with seating and order your own lunch. All breakfasts and most dinners are included. There are lots of restaurants near the hotels in Reykjavik and Akureyri.

**Food Allergies:** You must notify us no later than at final payment if you have a food allergy. This tour goes to some remote places where restaurants may not be able to satisfy all food allergies. An allergy causes

medical distress, a preference does not. For some allergies, please consider bringing your own snacks or food items so you are not dependent on what restaurants are able to serve.

**Itinerary and Fare Changes:** Our many suppliers may notify us about changes to the itinerary prior to departure and sometimes during the tour. We do our best to substitute a similar service if something cancels, but occasionally the only alternative is to provide a refund for the missed activity. Please note that if we are forced to cancel a tour component due to an issue beyond our control, the current penalties still apply if you choose to cancel the entire tour. This tour has been planned 1½ years in advance and released for reservations 13 months out. Please understand the need to be flexible and expect changes with such early planning. Hotels named can change, usually to equivalent or upgraded hotels. Changes to taxes, currency exchange rates, fuel surcharges, or other tour costs can occur at any time, therefore Wells Gray Tours reserves the right to increase fares due to such changes up to departure.

**Flight seating:** We are unable to take requests for window or aisle seating on the planes. The airline will not accept them, as group seating is assigned as a block. If this is important to you, we suggest you take the “No Flight” option with a fare reduction and book your own flight which allows seat selection. Please contact your local office in late July 2026 for pricing. Please refer to our [Terms & Conditions](#) for further information on the “No Flight” option.

**Flight upgrades:** Please enquire about current prices for upgrades on the flights from Vancouver to Keflavik and return. Icelandair Saga Class may be available, but usually sells out quickly.

**Flight delays or cancellations:** In the event flights are delayed or cancelled by airlines due to weather or other reasons, there may be additional costs to you. Wells Gray Tours will not pay for hotel rooms and meals during the delay. Most travel insurance policies cover expenses incurred for flight delays.

**Rooms for singles** are often a different style or smaller size than twin rooms. Many hotels limit the number of single rooms allocated to a group. Please book early if you prefer to travel single.

**Triples** are not available on this tour.

**Luggage Handling:** There are no luggage porters (bell staff) at any of the hotels where we stay in Iceland. Please be prepared to carry your own luggage from the coach to your room and back. Luggage handling is provided at the Inn at the Quay.



# TOUR POLICIES

**Payments:** A deposit of \$1,000 per person is requested at the time of booking and the balance is due February 10, 2027. By paying the deposit, you agree to the [Terms & Conditions](#), Activity Level 3 [Declaration](#), and Cancellation Policy outlined. Payments can be made by online banking or cheque (3% discount on tour fare), or by Visa or Mastercard.
